Overview of Scouting

We are the UK's biggest mixed youth organisation. We change lives by offering 4- to 25-year-olds fun and challenging activities, unique experiences, everyday adventure and the chance to help others so that we make a positive impact in communities.

Scouts helps children and young adults reach their full potential. Northumberland Scouts has a total membership of more than 7,100 including 1,605 adults and more than 5,500 4 - 18 year olds within 10 Districts:

- 374 Squirrels (4 – 6 year olds) within 31 Dreys
- 1,343 Beaver Scouts (6 - 8 year olds) within 88 Colonies
- 1,645 Cub Scouts (8 - 10 ½ year olds) within 95 Packs
- 1,570 Scouts (10 ½ - 14 year olds) within 91 Troops
- 623 Explorer Scouts (14 – 18 year olds) within 31 Units



Core skill areas

We've identified six core skill areas that make a good Scouting manager and leader:

1. Providing direction

A good County Programme Team Member will provide clear leadership to implement our vision within the relevant section.

2. Working with people

It is vital that a County Programme Team Member can create team spirit amongst the other volunteers they work with, and can form effective working relationships based on trust and the fundamental principles of Scouting:

- integrity
- respect
- care
- belief
- cooperation

3. Achieving results

County Programme Team Members ensure that goals are achieved, plans are seen through to completion, and that good relationships are maintained within and between District Programme and Section Teams. Forging links within the local community is also an important aspect of development.

4. Enabling change

It is important for a County Programme Team Member to encourage volunteers to think of creative ways to improve Scouting across the County. They should then provide the support to implement appropriate changes.

5. Using resources

A County Programme Team Member will ensure that information and resources are available, helping volunteers across the County to continue to provide excellent Scouting opportunities to young people.

6. Managing time and personal skills

A good County Programme Team Member should use their time effectively and be willing to continue to learn and improve their skills.

We're looking for someone that can grow into the role. So, if you have some of the skills detailed and the drive and enthusiasm to develop Beaver Scouting in Northumberland, you could be the person we are looking for. You can expect to receive support and training as part of your development within this role.

The County Programme Team

The County Programme Team oversees and supports the delivery of quality programmes for young people. This includes promoting and supporting Top Awards, and supporting Section programmes when activities or events are best done at County scale.

Other volunteers are automatically members of this team because of their roles in Scouts:

- Team Leaders of any County Programme Team sub-teams. For example, Top Awards Team.

The Role

Outline: To oversee and support the delivery of quality programmes for Beaver Scouts across Northumberland Scouts, by supporting District Programme Teams and delivering activities and events at a County level as appropriate.

Responsible to: County Programme Team Lead, Northumberland Scouts

Main contacts:

- County Programme Team
- County Leadership Team
- District Programme Team Leaders, District Programme Team members - Beaver Scouts
- Wider community contacts, businesses, other youth organisation leads etc

Appointment requirements: Must complete the relevant training for the role within the prescribed timescales. This role is likely to include contact with young people and will therefore require disclosure checks.

Main Tasks

To be an active member of the County Programme Team and support the delivery of our vision within Northumberland Scouts.

To help Beaver Sections within the County to deliver quality programmes:

- Set up networking and peer support at County scale so District Programme and Beaver Section Teams can share best practice
- Support District Programme Teams to share and make programme changes, such as new badges and activities.
- Promote, support and celebrate Beaver Section Top Awards and YouShape Awards
- Support District Programme and Beaver Section Teams to deliver projects where all young people can have a positive impact in the community.
- Work with Team Leaders, Team Members, campsites and activity centres to make nights away events happen.
- Support Beaver Scout volunteers across the County to access learning and undertake assessments for activity permits.

To set up activities and events in the County:

- Organise County events when District Programme and Beaver Section Teams decide they're needed, and make sure they're inclusive and accessible to all
